«Stated Choice Experiments in Development Research»

Many problems in so-called developing countries can only be solved by involving citizens. It is therefore crucial to learn more about individuals' preferences. Stated Choice Experiments (SCEs) can be used to measure preferences and to single-out the importance of different factors and combinations thereof for evaluating social, economic or political alternatives. In a SCE respondents chose from at least two alternatives, which vary in a number of attributes, the one they prefer most. They are frequently employed in areas such as transportation, health, agricultural, and environmental research. Yet, the method is also useful for political, sociological, and development research. The workshop will provide an introduction to SCEs. Participants will learn how SCEs can be designed and analysed.
